

New Batting Cages Installed at Community Park in Memory of Art Eller

Though raised in Southwest Erie, Art Eller spent his weekends and summers at his Grandparents farm near the current Robison Elementary School, so this area naturally felt like home. Always having the love of sports, but never the opportunity to participate growing up, Art got involved in little league baseball when his three kids. Mark, Bill and Joni, became of age. He enjoyed helping out as an assistant coach the first year, then decided to become a head coach for the next 5 years, beginning in 1964. He enjoyed much success including several championships, always emphasizing the importance of teamwork and the basics of how to be successful. During that time, Art was voted in as President of the Summit Recreation League; where he and several other fathers and mothers volunteered their time to raise money to improve and expand the sports opportunities for all children in Summit Township. In Art's final year as President, he convinced the leaders of Greene Township to allow the first little league field to be built behind the Greene Township grade school. This group of volunteers was ahead of their time, as they also introduced the first girls softball teams in both Summit and Greene Twp. Many of the top athletes who went on to star at both Fort LeBoeuf and Wattsburg started their understanding of teamwork with Coach Art Eller.

I'm writing this article in a classroom at Fort LeBoeuf High School, as I participate in Business Week with a group of fifteen AMAZING seniors! The program randomly places the senior class into nine different companies and pairs them each with a volunteer company advisor (like me) and a teacher. The companies have five short days to create a company, name it, come up with logos/advertisements/slogans, market their products and decide how the company's money is spent. Companies make financial decisions for a three year period in less than five days.

On the fifth day, the companies compete in different categories; advertising, stockholder's presentation, and trade show in front of volunteer business folks from various companies. A fourth competition is based on which company made the best financial decisions, earning the most money. Scores from all competitions are combined and students on the "Top Team" EACH receive \$100!!

I'll be rushing from the High School to Robison Elementary on Friday afternoon to participate in the annual Earth Day celebration with our grade school students. The activities and events planned by Paige Hanas and Maria Mankowski each year are both fun and educational, helping to turn Summit's youngest students into environmentally conscious residents. Hello residents! Another winter has passed and wasn't so bad compared to what we were given to deal with some years. April started a little ugly but it finished off with summer-like weather. The older I get, the more I appreciate sunshine and warm air!

We have more improvements planned this year with our garage and parks. At Picnicana we are expanding the parking lot, with what I refer to as overflow parking. Hopefully some minor plumbing upgrades at both parks. Some normal maintenance updates at the garage, some overall roof repairs at the parks and garage, and possibly some fencing around our construction yard which is well over due. Things we all try to keep up with to not get too far behind with maintenance.

The Township now has a new street sweeper and boom truck. They were past due for replacement; both were nearly 20 years old and obsolete for our needs. The new sweeper is much more efficient, does left or right sides without going against traffic, and is much safer with the use of LED arrow boards on the back for drivers to recognize sooner and be alert. Summit has 14 traffic light intersections which we maintain 24/7. Most of them are multiple lanes that have many lights at each intersection putting us well over 100 lights to maintain. The new boom truck is also much safer with an insulated boom to protect the worker from electrical hazard, a rope winch to lift large traffic lights into

place while the mechanic attaches it, and much LED lighting to get other drivers attention while working in traffic.

Something new with your license plate registration as of January 1st, 2017, is "ALPR", License plate reader technology that allows a single law enforcement officer to quickly, accurately, and reliably check the status of thousands of license plates on a single shift, using information from PennDOT's registration database to determine if there are expired registrations or lack of insurance for any licensed vehicle. Plate reader technology holds many advantages over the visual inspection of registration stickers, which can be counterfeited, sold, or affixed to dead plates. By searching the registration information using ALPR technology, a law enforcement officer can identify expired vehicle registrations and insurance coverage. If there is something wrong, the officer would be immediately alerted by the ALPR, of a problem with the vehicle's registration.

The last registration sticker will be issued December 30, 2016. Customers will still need to have their vehicles registered and inspected, but will not be required to display a registration sticker on their license plate after December 31, 2016.

NEW this year a FREE lunch will be provided by FLB School District for all registered children! Pop and snacks will be sold. For the Day Program, a charge account system for snacks is available. This system IS NOT available to the Pre-school Program. **Pre-school** children will be allowed to buy snacks at 12:50 p.m., only with a parent present.

SPRING CLEAN-UP 2016

FOR SUMMIT TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS ONLY!

Spring clean up will be handled as a **DROP-OFF PROGRAM** again this year. Township crews will only pick-up appliances containing freon (i.e. refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and dehumidifiers) for residents who have registered and paid for the freon removal in advance (**No later than May 11th**). Residents may bring all other eligible items to the Township garage during the time period detailed below. Township personnel will be on hand to accept items, which must be generated solely from your household and not brought in from elsewhere.

All residents will be required to show proof of residency (photo driver's license).

Please read this information carefully! Only those items listed will be accepted, all others will be turned away.

ALLOWABLE ITEMS FOR THIS YEAR'S COLLECTION

- Air Conditioners (required freon removal fee paid**)
- Appliances Limited to two appliances per household.
 Duplicates of same appliance not accepted (i.e. two dryers).
 Refrigerators/Freezers (doors removed and required Freon removal fee paid**)

Dehumidifiers (required Freon removal fee paid**)
Washers (clothes and dish), Dryers, Stoves, Hot Water Tanks

- Auto Parts (NO GAS TANKS)
- Demolition Waste bathtubs, sinks, toilets, house doors and windows ONLY (no other building demolition waste such as shingles, wood or blocks will be accepted)
- Electronics TVs, computers, keyboards, monitors, etc.
- Furniture TV's, mattresses, mattress springs, couch, chairs, dressers, tables
- Lawn Mowers/Roto-tillers/Snowblowers
- Metal Items (unlimited)
- Tires (@ nominal fee see cost breakdown listed below **)
 Limit 12 tires per person.

ITEMS **NOT** ALLOWED – THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED:

- No Bagged Material OF ANY KIND
- No Batteries
- No Demolition Waste other than items specifically listed above
- No Gasoline or Propane Tanks
- No Hazardous Waste OF ANY KIND
- No Household Garbage
- No Paint or Oil Cans
- No Junk Vehicles

If you are unsure about a specific item, please call the Township at 868-9686.

*** FREON REMOVAL FEE @ \$10.00 each (Non-Refundable) – Appliances that use freon require this fee payment to defray the cost of having Freon removed. Payment must be made at the Township Building by WEDNESDAY, MAY 11th. Crews will only pick up items with freon if the resident's name/address appears on a pre-paid list. Freon items must be placed CURBSIDE BY 8 a.m., THURSDAY, MAY 12th and will be picked up either the 12th or 13th.

** TIRE FEE – Tires will be accepted during drop-off hours with payment of the nominal per tire fee as follows:

\$2 – Tire OFF Rim \$3 – Tire ON Rim \$5 – Truck Tire (18 inch diameter or less) (19 inch diameter or more)

The nominal fee will help defray costs (per ton) associated with recycling of the tires by Waste Management.

(Note: Fee for tires is to be paid at the drop-off site, not in advance)

VEHICLES

Summit Township **CANNOT** take vehicles as part of spring clean up!

Vehicles that are unregistered/uninspected and visible on your property are in violation of Township Ordinances. Avoid prosecution by having them removed.

We will accept original fine art prints but they must be originals (no reproductions) three dimensional (3-D, clay, sculpture, metal and wood) and mixed mediums (works that combine more than one medium in a unique way). No crafts will be accepted. Art cannot be of inappropriate nature at the discretion of the show committee.

SUBMISSION DETAILS: No entry fee; Summit Township residents only; up to (3) entries per artist; must be no more than 30" wide (due to space); art must be framed or wired for hanging if you are a pastime or professional artist; student art needs only to be matted; entries can be marked "FS" (for sale) if so desired (an artist's inquiry box will be provided - all sales and any taxes are the responsibility of the artist.)

Our 19th Annual Golf Tournament will be held on Friday, June 3rd at Venango Valley Golf Course. The cost is \$70.00 per person or \$280.00 per foursome. This year a portion of our profits are being donated to help The Sight Center of Northwest PA, a primary resource for prevention of blindness and services to people who are visually impaired. We will be dedicating our Golf Tournament to the memory of several Summit Lions who have passed away since our last tournament. The dedication will be in memoriam for Lions Keith Ross, Ed Dick, Don Brogdon, and Eldon Boyd. All of these Lions dedicated their lives not only to the Lions Club, but also to their community. PERRY HI-WAY NEWS...

2016 RESIDENTIAL FUND DRIVE STARTED MAY 1

Residential fund drive letters have been mailed out for the May 1 start of the 2016 residential fund drive campaign. The start of the residential fund drive also starts our fiscal year. Just as in years past, every residential address should receive a fund drive mailing. Included in the pamphlet again this year is a listing of our operational budget for the 2016 – 2017 year. The total operational cost this year will be \$300,000.

Why such an increase over last year's budget? This year we need to make some major repairs to the parking area and driveway at the Robison Road station. We will also be doing some interior maintenance of painting walls and replacing some floor tile. As this station turns 21 years old this year we find it necessary to make these repairs. Time sure flies by. The other questionable repair is the roof. We have noted a couple small water stains in the celling, leading us to inspect our roof to see if the original roof is in need of replacement. We will also continue our preventative maintenance plan at the Oliver Road station. As this station turns 7 years old this year, we are finding a need to do some painting at this station as well. We are also finding that several light bulbs have been burning out and are being replaced as well as routine maintenance on the furnaces, air conditioning systems and social hall. It sure don't seem like it has been 7 years since we moved into the new station on Oliver Road.

The other new expense will include 4 months of payments toward our new rescue truck. The new truck is expected to be delivered in January 2017 so we will have to make payments for the first 4 months of 2017 (or the last 4 months of our fiscal year). We will take out a \$300,000 loan to pay the balance due on delivery. The total cost of this 25' stainless steel rescue truck was \$735,000. We expect this truck, custom designed to handle the challenges of Summit Township, to last for 30 years.

The rest of the budget contains many of the expenses we have each year. Fuel for the trucks, utility costs, trash removal, insurance coverages, ambulance supplies and maintenance cost for our vehicles and portable equipment.

We are holding our request at \$50.00 per household just as years past. What we want to see is an increase in the number of households that donate. Last year we had responses from only 39% of the homes in Summit Township. We would like that number to be 50% or higher. Your donation is tax deductible and stays here in Summit to help maintain and improve the fire, rescue and ambulance services we can provide to you. Please send in your donation today. PERRY HI-WAY TO ADD PAID STAFF

The time has come. After 68 years of all volunteer service Perry Hi-Way Hose Company has had to hire staff to meet the needs of an ever growing Summit Township. With the number of volunteers on the decline across the state and the nation, the Perry Hi-Way Board of Directors and the Board of Supervisors have developed a plan to hire a basic staff to provide fire, rescue and ambulance service to our Township. This staff will assist the volunteers in providing emergency services to the Summit Community. We still need more volunteers as the plan only provides for a single 2 person crew to be on duty 24/7/365.

Perry Hi-Way is determined to provide paramedics on scene of an emergency as soon as possible. Time studies were completed and found that, with our current volunteer system, it was an average of 17 minutes from dispatch until an ambulance arrived on scene and 19 minutes for the paramedic to arrive on scene. We found that it was taking the volunteer staff an average of 8 minutes to get to the station and respond with the ambulance. There were multiple factors for this time from weather, traffic congestion and the distances many of the volunteers had to travel to the station. By placing staff in the station we can shorten the time it takes for responders to arrive on scene by 7-8 minutes. We then discussed having our own Paramedics in station rather than waiting for paramedics to come from the City of Erie (Emergycare) or Millcreek Township (MPS).

A plan has been finalized by Perry Hi-Way to provide a basic staffing plan that has 1 EMT/firefighter and 1 Paramedic/firefighter on duty 24/7/365. This will make for 1 ALS ambulance crew or a 2 person crew on a fire truck for fire calls. We will also have a paramedic/firefighter to act as manager and do scheduling for the

paid personnel. This person will be in station M-F 8a – 4p and be the paramedic for the second ambulance, if needed. With this plan a total of 4 EMT/FF and 5 Medic/ FF will be hired. We still will utilize volunteer EMT's to staff our second ambulance and also to assist our paid staff on more serious emergencies. We will still need to have volunteers respond on fires and accidents to provide the necessary staff needed on these events. This new staffing policy will also keep the department in compliance with the new ambulances laws recently passed requiring all ambulance services to have at least 1 ambulance staffed 24/7/365.

This plan allows Perry Hi-Way to advance to provide paramedic services for the Summit Residents and provide a 2 person crew on duty 24/7/365.

SUMMIT TOWNSHIP SUPPORTS PERRY HI-WAY HOSE COMPANY

Summit Township has always been supportive of Perry Hi-Way Hose Company's efforts to provide firefighting, rescue and emergency services to the Township. A major goal of the Township Supervisors was to ensure that residents of Summit Township receive these services as quickly as possible. The Supervisors have decided to support Perry Hi-Way by appropriating a portion (95%) of the recently enacted \$52.00 per year Local Services Tax to Perry Hi-Way. This Local Services Tax matches most of Erie County's municipalities' Local Services Tax. Perry Hi-Way Hose Company would like to give a big thank you to all four recent Supervisors that worked diligently to generate this support. Jack, Nancy and Tom started the process and Mark came in and was involved in the final appropriation plan. However, this appropriation covers only a portion of Summit's needs and overall community support is still needed!

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT:

FROM SUMMIT TOWNSHIP TO LAKE ERIE ... WHEN IT RAINS IT DRAINS!

With the snow all melted and April showers turning into May flowers; it's the perfect time to talk about where all that water goes. Every property owner should be aware that, whenever they change a natural area by adding a structure or pavement, the water that was previously absorbed by the natural area (grass) must be directed somewhere else.

Because of existing topography, there are areas where water flows naturally. However, a property owner cannot send water to an adjacent property at a rate that is any faster that what it previously drained when it was undeveloped. When you build something or pave an area of your property; it's up to YOU to manage that water.

For more information on stormwater management, visit www.summittownship.com (click on Departments, then Land Development, and select the stormwater link on the right side of the page). Be a good neighbor and know where your water goes!

Also, remember that anything you put into your groundwater ends up in your drinking water.

This includes, pesticides, pet waste, oil or other liquids from leaking cars, eroding soil and anything you dump in a storm sewer drain. Please remember to properly dispose of paint and all types of household chemicals so that they don't end up in Lake Erie!

2016 County-Township taxes were mailed March 1, 2016, If you have not received a tax bill, please contact the office. Erie County Assessment will send your tax bill to the last address you provided. It is your responsibility to contact them to change any mailing addresses. I as the tax collector, cannot change the tax roll in any way. PA law states that you are responsible for your tax bill whether or not you received it. I can provide a Property Record Correction card to you and you can mail to Assessment. If you have any questions regarding change of address, please contact Erie County Assessment.

2016/2017 School tax bills will be mailed the first week of July. I will not know if there is a change in mills until the budget is passed in late June.

SUMMIT TOWNSHIP SEWER AUTHORITY

WATER SHUT OFF AGREEMENT

Customers with past due accounts should be aware that the Summit Township Sewer Authority and the Summit Township Water Authority are getting closer to ratifying an agreement that will result in the shut-off of water service for the non-payment of their sewer bill. While this is a new era for Summit Township it is nothing new in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania statues. Some customers have ignored our previous attempts to collect as we send reminders whenever a payment is late. Collection efforts, like the water shutoff policy, are necessary to maintain lower rates for all customers. Once an agreement is reached with the Water Authority delinquent customers should expect to see shut off notices this year. Please do not take this lightly; there will be additional costs added to delinquent bills because of the additional labor to locate, uncover and turn off the water service, then to restore the service once the bill is paid. We strongly encourage all delinquent customers to make payment arrangements now. Simply call the Authority Offices and ask for the billing clerk.

ROUTE 97 LIFT STATION PROJECT

G.M. McCrossin Inc, Bellfonte, PA is responsible for the general construction of the pump station and is still making good progress. Hill Engineering reports that the construction of the Route 97 Lift Station has reached a point where the structure is now out of the ground. The foundation and solid concrete walls that extend 35 feet below ground are now visible. In addition, the concrete first floor was poured in March and the excavation for the underground work was backfilled early in April.

Cox and Kanyuck, Meadville, PA is responsible for electrical work associated with the project. They have only been required to install a few conduits so far. Once the first floor walls and roof are complete they will be much more involved.

Chivers Construction, Fairview, PA will be performing the directional boring beneath I-90 soon and construction of the necessary piping and manholes is expected to start in June.

Currently, the project is on schedule so we still expect the construction to be completed before November 2016. MEADOWS LIFT STATION UPGRADES

Design of the improvements for the Meadows Lift Station is proceeding. The Authority Board is expected to select the Electrical Engineer at the April Regular Business Meeting. The professional staff and administration are recommending Steel Nation Engineering for the electrical engineering design.

If any sewer customer has any questions or concerns, please feel free to call the Authority at 868-4495 or attend a monthly meeting. Check your Township calendar for Sewer Authority meeting dates, (generally the last Thursday of the month, except March, November and December are one week earlier). The Authority hours are 8:00 AM - Noon and 12:30 - 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday. If you plan to attend a meeting, please call and let us know. We will be glad to put you on the agenda.


