SUPERVISOR'S CORNER

Hello Summit Residents,

We have seen another winter come and go and I'm looking forward to spring. We have been working on our street sweeping and yard repairs and are actually ahead of schedule.

There are several storm sewer projects scheduled for this summer which include; Hamot Road just north of New Road, Dorn Road midway between Peach Street and Hessinger Road, and the intersection of Footmill Road and Donation Road.

Paving Projects will be focused on the commercial district off of Peach Street and will include Mandy Lane between Commons Drive & Douglas Parkway and Keystone Drive west of Peach Street. Spot patch paving will be done in Glenmar Gardens.

Our ADA project is still ongoing in Valley View Subdivision and is expected to be finished this spring. We also have an ADA & Sidewalk project anticipated to begin this summer along the southwest side of Hamot Road from Chelsie Drive to Laurie Drive.

PennDOT continues to design the reconfiguration of the Five Points Intersection and expects construction to begin in 2021. Your input is valued for this project so please attend the public meeting at the Erie County Tech School on Thursday, May 2nd from 6:00pm-8:00pm.

Well, it would appear spring is here, and with that many projects will be taking place to prepare our parks and sports fields for the season ahead.

At Picnicana the insulation in the rec building will be finished and some repairs will be made to kitchen number one that sustained minor water damage from a leaking valve inside the wall last fall.

The Senior Center lighting will be upgraded to more efficient LED light fixtures. A new dishwasher and hot water heater were installed a few months ago making cleanup easier for those who use the center for lunches etc.

The ballfields at Community Park will be touched up. Field number three will have Duraedge material applied to the infield, making upkeep easier and playing ball safer.

I am looking forward to a warm and sunny summer ahead. Hopefully, everyone enjoys the nice weather while it is here.

Hello residents, it is good to see spring here and warmer days coming. We have started to work on repairing roads. The mild winter is exceptionally hard on them, due to the freeze-thaw cycles. Also, we are in the process of preparing equipment for another season at Picnicana and Community Park.

New development seems to be steady but under control. Nothing really big on the horizon at this time. In many ways, it's always good to work at a realistic pace. Projects and renovations in our township have been doing well as far as not blocking the roads or putting mud all over them. We try to keep our roads clean and not let them turn into a construction staging area.

Many issues going on in the county. The PA State Police are still looking for a centralized Police Barracks location, but nothing has been decided on where or announced by the PA Department of General Services.

I have been appointed to the Erie County 911
Recruitment and Retention committee this past fall. We are working with all municipalities in Erie County to try and solve the EMS and volunteer firefighter shortage. Not an easy task. Most of the public have very busy lifestyles today and there are not near enough volunteers to go around.

Perry Highway Hose Company has done a fantastic job keeping up as first responders but at the same time,

mutual aid has been making it very hard on them. When outlying areas of Erie County's Emergency Services drop calls because of the lack of volunteers or a paid service, the next fire company available gets the call to provide the service. Therefore, one way or the other, Erie County is going to have to step it up simply because they have many areas very short on first responder services. This is a Statewide and a National problem.

We are scheduling more sidewalk projects in Summit this year, which we budget for every year, just to keep up and stay on track with our ADA improvement plan. One project will improve connectivity with our subdivisions on Hamot Road.

Another project planned, Matt Jonas will talk about in this newsletter, is the replacement of our little old narrow bridge on old French Road which is just north of Picnicana.

PennDOT just announced they will have a public meeting May 2nd from 6:00pm-8:00pm at the Erie County Technical School to discuss Road improvements on Oliver Road and the roundabout scheduled for 2021 Construction

With the nice weather coming, please drive careful, watch for children, bicycles, and motorcycles.

Greetings fellow residents. As this quarterly publication comes out, we should be well past the snow and cold and into the warmer sunnier days of spring. For the fire department, that signals the start of grass/brush fire season, the potential for motorcycle accidents and the yearly residential fund drive campaign. Just as years past, the residential fund drive kicks off May 1st.

We expect the fund drive mailer to go out for delivery to your home around May 1st. This is the fire department's biggest and most important fundraising event. The residential fund drive has been done by mail only for many years now. Years ago, when we had more volunteers and less homes to visit, the fund drive was completed by the volunteers going door to door. This is no longer possible with our small membership and ever-expanding residential population.

We have had to increase the amount we are asking from every residence this year in order to keep up with our operating costs. We have not had an increase in our request for many years, yet our costs for operations have risen steadily. Included in the newsletter is a copy of our operational budget for you to review and see where your donations will go. I think many of you will be surprised at the costs to maintain our services to you. We are asking for every household to send in a donation this year. The current support rate of only 32% of households making a **tax-deductible** donation to Perry Hi-Way Hose Company cannot sustain the level of protection we provide 24/7/365.

Our small group of volunteers, currently 14 emergency responders, continue to take classes and answer the emergency calls in combination with the small paid staff of 2 or 3 members on duty every day. The number of emergency calls for last year totaled 1918, a record high number of calls received since our beginning back in 1948. 1277 of these calls were in Summit Township and 641 were to surrounding Townships on mutual aid. Just as Perry Hi-Way is suffering with low numbers of volunteers so too are our surrounding municipalities, making the need for mutual aid more prevalent.

We want to thank all those who came out to support our comedy show on February 23rd and the spring flea market/rummage sale at the fire station on April 28. We had almost 60 tables full of items for sale, filling the social hall to capacity. We will be planning to do both events again next year. Watch for the dates in future newsletters. Our fall fundraisers will be our purse Bingo on November 10th as well as 3 Christmas auctions. These dates will be confirmed and listed in the next newsletter.

In closing, I am asking for all residents of the Summit Community to support **your** emergency services provider. Please send in your donation once you receive our fund drive letter and attend our various fundraising events. Stop in to the fire station to see what your donations pay for. Let us work together to make the emergency services in Summit Township the best they can be. While we hope you don't need us, we stand ready to help in your time of need.

Let's get out there and enjoy the warmer sunny weather that spring has delivered and chase away those winter blues. More next Quarter.

Our crew arrived quickly and were able to defibulate (shock) their heart to restart it with our AED. This patient was able to leave the hospital 4 days later and is doing well today.

A big congratulations to all those who made receiving these awards possible!

The Day Program for ages 6-16 meets 11 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. You must be six years of age to come to the Day Program, and have completed Kindergarten. The Pre-school Program for ages 3-5 meets Tuesday and Thursday, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Children must be **fully potty-trained**.

ALL CHILDREN MUST WEAR SOCKS AND SHOES DAILY. **REGISTRATION**

Registration forms will be available on the Township Website summittownship.com and at the Township Municipal Building. Please call the Township Office at 868-9686 if you need them mailed directly to your home. **Completed registration forms must be received by the Township by May 24, 2019.**

No late registrations will be accepted.

Registration fee for **Summit Township Residents** for the Day Program is \$150 per child. Immediate families with three or more children will be charged \$350. Pre-school registration fee is \$100 per child. **Non-Residents** Daytime rate is \$175.00 per child. For Pre-School the fee is \$150.00 per child. Contact Pat McGuire (868-9032) if interested in a one-week registration at a cost of \$50/week per resident child and \$60/week per non-resident child. Requests will be honored, based upon availability, on a first-come first-served basis.

Springtime Reminders from the Land Development & Zoning Office

Zoning Districts:

There are thirteen (13) different Zoning Districts in Summit Township.
 Please call the Township Land Development and Zoning Office with any questions pertaining to specific Zoning Districts.

Zoning & Building Permits:

- Although there are situations when a Zoning or Building Permit is not required, be safe and assume you need a Zoning and Building Permit for all construction. Contact the Summit Township Land Development and Zoning Office for clarification regarding your specific project and situation.
- Accessory structures under 100 square feet in size do not require a Zoning Permit; however, all accessory structures must maintain the proper front, side and rear yard setbacks.
- Residential accessory structures under 1,000 square feet in size do not require a Building Permit and subsequent inspections.
- Inground swimming pools require a Zoning Permit, but above ground swimming pools do not require a Zoning Permit; however, all swimming pools must maintain the proper front, side and rear yard setbacks.
- All swimming pools with a holding capacity of twenty-four (24) inches
 or more of water in depth require a Building Permit and subsequent
 inspections under the Uniform Construction Code. These pools will
 likely require an impassible barrier which is legislated by the Uniform
 Construction Code.
- Decks require a Zoning Permit and must maintain the proper front, side and rear yard setbacks.
- Decks that are thirty (30) inches or more in height above grade require a Building Permit ans subsequent inspections.

Vehicle Storage:

 Motor vehicles without current, valid license plates or inspection stickers, or vehicles which have been accident or fire damaged shall not be parked or stored in any zoning district, unless stored in compliance with the provisions of Section 617 of the Zoning Ordinance.

SPRING CLEAN-UP 2019

FOR SUMMIT TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS ONLY!

Spring clean up will be handled as a **DROP-OFF PROGRAM** again this year. Township crews will only pick-up appliances containing Freon (i.e. refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and dehumidifiers) for residents who have registered and paid for the Freon removal in advance (**No later than May 8th**). Residents may bring all other eligible items to the Township garage during the time period detailed below. Township personnel will be on hand to accept items, which must be generated solely from your household and not brought in from elsewhere.

All residents will be required to show proof of residency (photo driver's license).

Please read this information carefully! Only those items listed will be accepted, all others will be turned away.

ALLOWABLE ITEMS FOR THIS YEAR'S COLLECTION

 Duplicates of same appliance not accepted (i.e. two dryers).
 Refrigerators/Freezers (doors removed and required Freon removal fee paid**)

Washers (clothes and dish), Dryers, Stoves, Hot Water Tanks

- Auto Parts (NO GAS TANKS)
- Demolition Waste bathtubs, sinks, toilets, house doors and windows ONLY (no other building demolition waste such as shingles, wood or blocks will be accepted)
- Electronics TVs, computers, keyboards, monitors, etc.
- Furniture TV's, mattresses, mattress springs, couch, chairs, dressers, tables
- Lawn Mowers/Roto-tillers/Snowblowers
- Metal Items (unlimited)
- Tires (@ nominal fee see cost breakdown listed below **)
 LIMIT 12 TIRES PER HOUSEHOLD.
- Automotive Batteries

ITEMS **NOT** ALLOWED – THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED:

- No Bagged Material OF ANY KIND
- No Demolition Waste other than items specifically listed above
- No Gasoline or Propane Tanks
- No Hazardous Waste OF ANY KIND
- No Household Garbage
- No Paint or Oil Cans

FROM YOUR SUMMIT TAX COLLECTOR:

Happy Spring!

As I write this newsletter it is sunny but a bit cold. Spring is here and the birds are chirping and the flowers popping up even though it is a tad cool.

By the time this news article reaches you, April 30th, the end of discount for county-township tax bills has passed. Face for CT is good through June 30th. July 1 begins penalty of 10%. School bills will be mailed June 30th. The school passes their budget in June, so I do not know until that time if there will be a mil increase. The second round of interims also are dated July 1st. These interim tax bills are "catch up" bills if you will, that prorate the assessed difference from the time you either closed on a new construction home, had a new mobile home moved into a park or have done some type of construction that would change the value of your home/property. Please remember the school bills are on a fiscal year from July 1 of any given year through June 30th of the next year. The color for school bills will be canary this year.

If you require a receipt, you can either bring both copies of your tax bill into the office when you pay or if sending via USPS (or in the locked mailbox to the right of the office door), send both copies and a S.A.S.E. This is stated on your tax bill. If your mortgage company pays your taxes, keep one copy for yourself and I can stamp. Mortgage companies only need one copy. If you lose your receipt, you can request a receipt via email to the email address listed below. I do not send receipts to 3rd parties such as accountants.

Just a reminder that I cannot take postdated checks (checks dated in the future). They cannot be deposited therefore your taxes are NOT paid. Your taxes are technically paid when your check clears the bank. If you do incur an NSF (not sufficient funds), you are required to "make good" on that payment in cash or certified funds. Payment will not be accepted unless the \$25.00 NSF fee is paid. This is also stated on your tax bill. I apologize for repeating this information, but these seem to be issues that keep happening.

August 31st this year falls on Saturday and Labor Day is Monday, September 2nd, I will accept discount in the office on Tuesday, September 3rd ONLY during regular business hours for school payments. Payment through the USPS mail MUST have postmark date of August 31st. Payments postmarked after August 31st will be returned and due at Face. You may also use the locked mailbox to the right of the office door. Do not leave cash in the locked mailbox. Please make sure your checks are correct and your phone number is on your check. If your check is incorrect and I have to return it to you, it is due in the payment period it is received in. I have to do reports and make remittances to the taxing authorities before the 10th of September.

FLB's Bison Tech Team was tasked with building a robot of their own design and code for the First Tech Challenge. The theme for this year's competition was Rover Ruckus.

The team was made up of the minds of 14 students from both the middle and high school. Many different mindsets and creative ideas came together through a combined team.

"Being our first year we wanted to establish a solid foundation for the years to come. This involved treading into unknown waters all of the time. We were able to meet many goals we created and show teams what we were capable of as a rookie team," said Andrew Crilley, junior, team captain.

On Feb. 24, the team traveled to Upper Saint Clair, PA for their first competition.

"In the individual competition we placed thirteenth. The top four teams were allowed to pick two teams to help them win (each round is played with four teams, two teams on each alliance), the top team picked us as one of their alliance members. Our alliance won overall, but we were unable to advance onto the state level," said sophomore Ashley Riley.

The top team recognized Bison Tech as a strong competitor and selected them to be a part of their winning alliance. The team was surprised that they were chosen considering it was their first year.

"We were in shock to see that we had won first alliance in our beginning season as it showed what we are truly capable of and what others should be looking out for in the future," said Crilley. For the competition, the team had to create a self-driving robot that was able to lift objects.

"The tasks that we are given by First Tech took a long time to be able to accomplish in such a tight time frame. Having a large team as we had allowed for us to break into subgroups based on our strengths. This made it so we could accomplish multiple goals at once and then meet up in the end and review what was done as a group," said Crilley.

The team was divided into management, coding and building. Management kept meeting records and detailed reports about the robot. Coding worked on creating a program that would allow the robot to run. Building worked on creating the robot of their own design.

"I had to focus on team management and the Engineering Notebook, while other members such as Josh Elegeer focused on the design and build, but ultimately we all were able to overlap when we had ideas and suggestions to give," said Crilley.

FROM THE SEWER AUTHORITY

MEADOWS LIFT STATION

On January 24, 2019 the Summit Township Sewer Authority, (STSA) opened bids for the proposed replacement and upgrade of the Meadows Lift Station. The lowest qualified bidder was Konzel Construction Company, Inc., Erie. Their bid was \$582,000. The following additional bids were received: McLallen Construction, Erie: \$632,150; Chivers Construction, Fairview: \$672,000 and S.E.T. Inc, Lowellville: \$711,000.

The current project is a major upgrade of a lift station that was constructed in 2002 by the developer of the Meadows Subdivision. The station was dedicated to STSA for ownership and operation in 2003. Originally in 2003, when the station was put into service, the number of connections was expected to be 145 news homes in the Meadows Subdivision. Fairly soon after the subdivision was nearing completion, additional homes from the surrounding area began to be connected via tributary extensions.

In 2007 the STSA completed the South Hill Area Project with 3 additional lift stations, serving another 112 existing homes, was connected to the Meadows Lift Station. Also in 2007, a developer began the Cherry Hill Village Subdivision that would ultimately add 127 new homes. Then in 2008, the Country Side Subdivision began construction of an additional 106 homes. Lastly in 2014, the Cherry Hill Crossing Subdivision added another 60 homes. With a total of 550 homes connected into the Meadows Lift Station it has become an integral component of the Route 97 Subsystem. In addition, the proposed station will be capable for some future growth. However, at some point the 4,350 lineal feet force main will have to be upsized from 6" to 8" to accommodate the increase in flow.

The project is moving along satisfactorily in the initial phase construction. On February 28, 2019 the contractor was issued a notice to proceed and on March 20th the preconstruction meeting was held. The work is expected to be completed within 180 days. We at the STSA believe that this is a needed and important upgrade to the Summit Township public sanitary sewer system and expect to see it in service for many years to come.


ENGINEER'S REPORT

The Old French Road Bridge is progressing. We were able to purchase the precast bridge and foundations directly from the manufacturer through Pennsylvania's COSTARS program. This is a system where Municipalities can purchase products off of existing open-end State contracts. Since the bridge is a significant cost, by doing this we see some cost savings on the project. So, on April 3rd, we went out for bid for the demolition of the existing bridge and the installation of the new bridge. The project should be awarded in May. Construction is still anticipated to begin in August.

Another project that has gone out to bid recently for construction this summer is the Hamot Road Sidewalk Project Phase 1. This project consists of ADA curb ramps and crosswalks at the intersection of Hamot Road and Chelsie Drive. It also includes the construction of approximately 1350 feet of 5-foot-wide sidewalk from Chelsie Drive to Laurie Drive along the southwest side of Hamot Road connecting into the Trails at Five Points. This is the first phase of a multi-phase project to improve pedestrian mobility in this area by interconnecting the subdivisions with sidewalks.

The next phases will see sidewalk extend along Laurie drive to Hamot Road, and the sidewalk on Hamot Road continue to Dorn Road and end at Marlee Way. This is one project heavily requested by the public during the Township's recent Comprehensive Plan update, and the Supervisors decided to fast track this project and to get Phase 1 going as soon as possible. It is anticipated the project will be awarded in May, and construction is to proceed as quick as possible in the hopes that the sidewalk will be open this summer.

This year's paving project will be two streets off of upper Peach Street. The first will be Mandy Lane from Douglas Parkway to Commons Drive (the road between Northwest Savings Bank and Eat'n Park). The second street is Keystone Drive from Peach Street west to the cul-de-sac. More information will be provided in a later report.
